By the time you receive this report it will be December and Thanksgiving will have come and gone. I sincerely hope your Thanksgiving was enjoyable, relaxing, and peaceful, and that you had time for reflection before you began formulating plans for the Christmas holidays and the New Year. If you are like me, you ran out of days before you ran out of projects this year.

The Board meeting of November 10 was filled with tasks that needed to be done. We dealt with a member's concern that we may be getting overcharged for our water from the PUD. The issue was resolved with some clarification from the PUD. We dealt with some critical issues concerning our email provider; and those issues caused the delay in getting our *Kala Pointer* out to you. We have agreed to test a new provider for the next two months on a free trial basis.

On Sunday evening, November 7, someone ran into our gate and damaged the gate and the mechanism. We are waiting on an estimate for the repairs. In less than two days, our staff identified the person, notified the police, discussed it with the person, and verified insurance coverage. Thanks again to our staff.

A few changes were made to our personnel policy for clarification. Our General Manager is securing estimates for replacing the floating dock, and upgrading some electrical wiring for the mail station at the gate and for the men's locker room. The staff is getting ready for snow as they continue with clean up after another storm.

We have two new employees: Janice Svien in an office-support position and Isaiah Prestwick at the Clubhouse. If you get a chance, stop by and say hello to them.

Committees: (1) The Tree Committee continues its work on the revisions to the Apps, (2) the Elections Committee has formed an ad hoc committee to begin its work toward Online Voting, and (3) the BMAC committee will be setting up a meeting in January (date to be determined) to include members, BMAC, and County officials to coordinate efforts on tightline inspections for those along the Bluff.

## What Happened at the November Board Meeting?

Another riveting 110 minutes and unless you were one of the eight members in attendance, you missed it. If nothing else, this year's Board is learning the art of the short meeting.

If you are one of my faithful readers, you already know that I will probably stray far afield of just reporting what happened from 1:00 p.m. until 2:50 p.m. on November 10. So if you really must know the official reportage of that meeting, I direct you the official minutes on the kalapoint.org website, looking under the "Member" tab. It certainly won't be as exciting as being there but I guarantee a more precise account of what happened minute by minute. (I guess that's why they call 'em minutes.)

Two of Kala Point's charitable contributions to the East Jefferson County community were reported upon. First was the Food Drive headed up by Ann Bambrick. She has received cash and checks amounting to over \$9000 to be donated to the Jefferson County Food Bank.

The other, some folks might consider two, are Toys for Tots and Christmas for Children. The two are both fine programs that merge into one at the Jefferson County Fairgrounds in early December each year to pack and distribute Christmas to low income families/neighbors of Jefferson County. The Toys for Tots donations are delivered from county collection points like Kala Point, (always one of the largest deliveries, of which we should be proud) and the Marine Corp's National program. While that is an outstanding program in itself, in 1974 Christmas for Children was founded in order to deliver special gifts (what the child wished for and what the parent said was needed) using Christmas Giving Trees "planted" in businesses around the Tri-Area (Port (Continued on page 3)

Hadlock, Chimacum and Port Ludlow). Port Townsend had a similar program until 2013 when it was merged with the Christmas for Children project to make the wonderful Christmas charity it is today. This year Kala Point will participate in both parts of the program. Now you will be able to see that children of low income families (identified through County Dept. of Social Services into the same box as Toys for Tots in the Clubhouse) receive what every kid wants for Christmas. Lots of toys! You can also choose a tag or tags from the Giving Tree in the Clubhouse and add a specific child to your Christmas shopping list and buy a "wished for" or a "needed item or even both for that child. The age and gender of the child will be on the tag and you simply attach the tag to the gift and drop off at the Clubhouse. Remember, all gifts should be un-wrapped. Now the magic happens in Santa's Workshop, Jefferson County branch. Volunteers from many community organizations help the Christmas for Children folks. On Day 1 we build about 1200 boxes, then label them by family. On Day 2 deliveries come from all over the county. Some are from the Giving Tree locations with the wishes and needs, more from the Toys for Tots locations and, finally a large truck from the U.S. Marines. The next few hours are spent setting up two buildings in the Fairgrounds. One contains all of the un-designated toys by gender and age appropriateness. Thousands of toys, clothing, puzzles, art supplies, books, etc. will be sorted to tables. In the main building the Giving Tree gifts will be sorted by family numbers. Then the fun begins! The tagged gifts are placed in the appropriate family box along with some mandatory items. (Every child gets gloves, socks, toothbrush, and candy). After the wished for and needed items are boxed, then the "shopper" volunteers go shopping in the toy building for things to add to the family boxes. Finally comes Day 3 when the parents come to the Fairgrounds to pick up their box or boxes to hide at their home until December 25. Christmas for Children/Toys for Tots does not just give a toy or two to a child. It gives families a real old fashioned family Christmas! Probably like the ones most us remember. Day 3 is also the day of thanks, tears of gratitude, tears of joy, and exhaustion of the volunteers, some of whom have been there every minute of the three days. If you want to volunteer to help on one or more of the three days of Christmas, or just want more information, give me a call at 360-301-9604.

While I type this missive another Christmas thought occurs, perhaps brought by the view from my window of the two Shane's feeding the wood chipper with our downed limbs. Both attired in full rain gear, goggles, hardhats, and ear protection to ward off the wind, rain, noise, and flying cedar branches of Kala Point on a stormy day. My thought? Have you sent your Employee Appreciation gift for our great staff? If not, Christmas is coming...get on it!

Winds (at my house) reached a high of 34 mph from the southeast on October 9 and were 20 mph or higher on 7 days, 3 days more than in September 2015.

Seattle had 4.81" of rainfall in October, compared to the normal precipitation of 3.48". Seattle had 15 cloudy days, 14 partly cloudy days, and 2 clear days. The warmest Seattle day, October 5, was 74. The coldest day, October 23, was 45°. Highest wind gusts were 45 mph from the south by west on October 10 and 45 mph from the south-southwest on October 30.

Kala Point had 3.24" of precipitation in November by November 18 compared to 0.98" in the same period in 2014.

This month's weather trivia: The highest wind speed ever recorded was 231 mph at the Mt. Washington Observatory (NH), in April 1934.







## Crucial Step Taken Toward Completion of Missing Link in the Olympic Discovery Trail by Ron Wheeler

On November 16, the Jefferson County Board of County Commissioners voted unanimously to authorize a feasibility study to establish the route for the ODT-Eaglemount Trail, bypassing SR-20 from Four Corners Road to US 101 at the head of Discovery Bay. The authorization was performed by way of adding the study project to the County's Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP).

The Olympic Discovery Trail will ultimately be a 126 mile multipurpose non-motorized trail running from Port Townsend to the Pacific, via Discovery Bay Village, Gardiner, Blyn, Sequim, and Port Angeles. About 70 miles of the ODT have been built, and another large section on the north side of Lake Crescent is nearing completion. The six-mile Eaglemount section is the longest section of the trail that has not yet been planned – largely because of daunting topographical challenges.

Jefferson County, the City of Port Townsend, and the Port of Port Townsend have completed the Larry Scott Memorial Trail (the beginning of, and easternmost segment of the Olympic Discovery Trail) from Port Townsend to Discovery Road, and the County is about to start construction of the Discovery Bay South Trail from Old Gardiner Road to Snow Creek at the head of the Bay. But the crucial connection between those two trails has remained undeveloped, leaving hikers, cyclists, and others to transport themselves on the highway – putting themselves and motorists at risk.

The Olympic Discovery Trail shares the Eaglemount route section of the trail with the federal Pacific Northwest National Scenic Trail – the newest part of the National Scenic Trails network. The PNNST was established in 2009 as a result of legislation sponsored by Representative Norm Dicks and Senator Maria Cantwell. Former Representative Dicks, now in private practice, has been working with state and federal officials, including U.S. Representative Derek Kilmer, State Representative Steve Tharinger, the Washington State Department of Transportation, and the Washington State Department of Natural Resources to support Jefferson County in planning, and ultimately building, the trail. "PNT hikers, bicyclists, mobility impaired persons, bike-touring groups, and motorists will all be safer, healthier, and happier with a trail bypassing SR-20. And a completed world-class ODT should be great for the economy," Dicks said.

Jeff Selby, vice-president of the Peninsula Trails Coalition, says that the next step is to fund the study, which his organization hopes to accomplish soon, with the object of completing the study within the next four months so that grant funding for construction of first section(s) of the trail can perhaps be applied for in May 2016. "The schedule is tight, but now that this crucial first step has been taken by Commissioners Johnson, Kler, and Sullivan, we can move ahead – after working toward this for 25 years we hope to maintain this newly found momentum," Selby said. "Everyone should thank the Commissioners, the County Administrator, and the County's Public Works Department for what they have done." ## The Function of Kala Point's Emergency Preparedness Committee

The fundamental purpose of the Emergency Preparedness Committee (EPC) is to help all of us living at Kala Point cope in case we become isolated from the larger Quimper Peninsula Community because of an emergency situation. I used to think that the likelihood that such a situation would occur is so remote that it wasn't worth putting much effort into preparedness. But, I have changed my mind. Here are some situations that could force us to rely on our own resources for an extended period of time.

<u>Severe wind storm</u>: The November wind storm brought down a few trees in Kala Point, one through a house roof, and a great quantity of debris. Kala Point lost electric power for 12 hours but we were warned that the outage could have lasted two to three days.

<u>Severe snow storm</u>: In 2007 we suffered through a week-long snow storm that made it very difficult to leave Kala Point.

<u>Extended power outage</u>: This could happen because of storms and because of the failure of a piece of equipment. For example, a substation transformer could fail without a replacement being readily available. Purchasing a replacement would take weeks, perhaps even months. We were lucky in the November outage that we were back on line so quickly.

<u>Earthquake</u>: New Yorker magazine recently published an article suggesting that we are overdue for a monumental earthquake that would isolate much of western Washington for months.

Wild Fire: We may be particularly vulnerable because we have so many trees.

I think there is a significant likelihood that at least one of these will occur in the next few years. If this should happen, the Emergency Preparedness Committee (EPC) will send volunteers block-to-block to identify those who need help, will provide first aid support as needed, will communicate by radio within and outside Kala Point our situation and requests for aid, and will provide help for those caring for pets. But, unfortunately, the EPC will not be able to provide water and food to everyone at Kala Point for the duration. Nor will we be able to supply individual prescription medicines. It is therefore essential that everyone have extra prescription medicines, food and water supplies, and warm clothes and blankets to carry them through an emergency situation.

### So Proud of Kala Point

Kala Point's October fundraiser to benefit the Jefferson County Food Banks was, as usual, a wonderful success. Community-wide, this fundraiser is called "The Wave", and many businesses, organizations, churches, and communities like ours (Cape George, Port Ludlow, etc.) have collected food and money for the food banks for a number of years. Kala Point stopped collecting food some years ago, as the Food Banks prefer to receive money. This is understandable, as they can purchase food at wholesale prices of 4 cents per pound, and know that what they purchase is fresh and not out-of-date. Food donations this year were 3,170 lbs., up by 1,775 lbs, and financial donations were up by \$546, totaling \$15,297. Kala Point has been the leader, year after year, in funding the Food Banks through our participation in The Wave fundraisers. This year was no exception. I was proud, beyond words, to present the Wave coordinator, Pastor Skip Cadorette, with checks totaling **\$8,900**.

I want to quote from a note received from Pastor Skip: "A note like this does not (cannot) begin to express my thankfulness for your ministry to the hungry of PT, Quilcene, Brinnon, and the Tri-Area. We had an excellent WAVE this year, but the truth is the bulk of our success is because of the marvelous Kala Point Community. Thank you! Thank You!"

I have never been part of a more generous community than the one we live in.




