

What's Happening with the Board?

The KPOA Board met, June 8, 2021, via Zoom, with all directors present, except for Sean Moss (due to conflicts with his work schedule.) Also present: GM K. Larson, CFO D. Colwell, and 15 residents.

Announcements:

- The next Annual Meeting is scheduled for December 14, 2021
- The Board is seeking to fill a five-month vacancy (August–December 2021) due to the resignation of Tom Gillespie. If interested in serving, send email to the General Manager (gm_larson@kalapoint.org)

During the time designated for member comments, Patsy Mathys urged that the Board not lose track of the distinction between must-have and nice-to-have features so as not to add unnecessary costs to the new website.

Under member correspondence, D. Kimball reported that six emails on a variety of topics received and responded to, as well as one anonymous letter claiming parking and storage violations (both addressed in the GM's Report).

In the **GM's report**, there were several notable items:

- The entrance gate has been repaired and the person responsible for the damage was billed for the full cost.
- KPOA applied to re-authorize a hydraulic permit that will allow scraping sand from the boat ramp. The current plan is to scrape the ramp every Friday through the Labor Day weekend.
- Jefferson County Public Health Directive No. 2021-2 drops the requirement for mask-wearing indoors for all who are fully vaccinated, affecting both the clubhouse and the Administration Office. Proof of vaccination will be required.
- The KPOA GM has successfully recruited a second maintenance person, Raymond Loring. Staffing the clubhouse remains a challenge.
- KPOA Staff is monitoring pool usage and making adjustments in the schedule. Less than full use of family swim is increasing time for lap swim. It is expected that the Jacuzzi can be opened soon.

The Kala Point community is a common-interest residential homeowner association (HOA). When purchasing or building within Kala Point, homeowners agree to follow the HOA's governing documents, which include: Conditions, Covenants and Restrictions of Record (CC&Rs); Rules and Regulations; Bylaws; and detailed Administrative Policies and Procedures (APPs). APPs are Board-enacted rules. The protective umbrella of these governing documents works in the best interest of all homeowners ensuring higher standards of neighborhood appearance and enhancing the collective value of the homes.

Under Board Business:

- G. Obermeyer, chair of the Ad Hoc Website Advisory Committee (WAC), presented recommendations for design principles and functionalities to be incorporated in a new and improved KPOA website. By unanimous consent, the Board authorized the development of a Scope of Work based on the committee recommendations (see details in the WAC Update on Page 18).
- CFO D. Colwell reported on budget requests from standing committees to be compiled for presentation at the July Board meeting.
- The Board was informed that Jefferson County has tightened the dog leash ordinance (limiting off-leash designations to dog parks only). The rule does not apply to property owned by Kala Point but does to the public beach area (below the mean high-tide line.) Concerns were raised that the wording on the current off-leash sign might mislead KPOA residents to believe that the entire beach is an off-leash and create the potential of exposing KPOA residents to hefty fines. President Rovanpera will reach out to the deputy sheriff and investigate possible actions for consideration at the July meeting.
- In response to a request from Charla Jean to hold yoga classes in the Clubhouse, the Board affirmed that members can book the facility for free classes with the understanding that "free" also prohibits requests for or encouragement of gratuities. The GM will include this condition in facilities requests.

COVID Vaccine Documentation

You probably received a Center of Disease Control COVID-19 Vaccination Record Card when you got vaccinated. But what if your record card has been misplaced? What if you need more official proof for overseas travel or on cruise ships?

The European Union is launching a Digital Green Pass, known by some as a "vaccine passport" to allow visitors into their country. Unfortunately, the EU does not consider the CDC record card as official, and is instead requiring documentation needs from a U.S. government database.

Fortunately, Washington State has a database, somewhat similar to MyChart, of COVID and other vaccinations. If desiring access to your vaccine history, you can register on www.doh.wa.gov/. COVID vaccine detail includes vaccine manufacturer, dates and lot numbers. Details are being worked out with the EU, but this may become your official vaccine proof for travel.

European countries are allowing vaccinated US citizens to visit Greece, France, Spain, Croatia and Cyprus. Read more about updates on whether U.S. citizens can get an EU digital vaccine passport: www.cnn.com/travel/.

Even if not traveling, the Washington State database is a handy tool to verify your full vaccine history and to make sure you are up-to-date with your vaccines. •





The king tides and high winds this past winter washed the sand out from under the old bench and rotted the wood of the bench. This bench had been placed in memory of a Kala Point member years ago. For safety reasons, this bench was initially taken away by KPOA with no plans to replace it.

But this had been the bench for taking off and putting on shoes, for sharing a picnic, for sipping a beer, for setting down a sweater, and for just sitting there to

The resulting creation was fastened together with stainless-steel connections. The KPOA budget helped pay for the wood but the hours of labor were a donation; the result is a lasting piece of art.

The benches are found by taking a short walk off the south end of the beach parking lot. These new chairs are made for a relaxing, laid-back experience including the ability to set down the glassware and a plate of food. But the plastic bench with a higher bottom and a straight back is a bit easier for those needing assistance to stand. 

After I made this delightful cake, I decided it was given the wrong name. Rhubarb Custard Cake may be an apt description, but it doesn't begin to convey the scrumptious, oh-this-is-so-good-ness of the sweet-tart taste in combination with the is-this-cake-or-is-this-custard texture. Originally from *Taste of Home* magazine, and making use of seasonally abundant produce, this cake is super simple and really good.

Contributor **Pam Kolacy** suggested making a yellow cake from scratch if I didn't want to use a cake mix, and since I have all the ingredients to make a cake, and didn't have a box cake handy, that's what I did. I used the yellow sheet cake (without the chocolate frosting) from **Sally's Baking Addiction** as the base and didn't even need to add whipped cream when I served it. It's just that good all on its own. My husband says this is a keeper.

Rhubarb Custard Cake

- 1 package yellow cake mix (and other ingredients needed to make the cake)
- 4 cups chopped fresh or frozen rhubarb
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup heavy whipping cream

Whipped cream and fresh mint, optional

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Prepare cake batter according to package directions.

Pour into a greased 13 x 9 inch baking dish.

Sprinkle with rhubarb and sugar.

Slowly pour cream over top.

Bake until golden brown, 40-45 minutes.

Cool on a wire rack for 15 minutes before serving.

Garnish with whipped cream and mint if desired.

Refrigerate leftovers. •



Irish Coffee

Prepare to fall under the charm of the most famous coffee cocktail of all time. There's many a tall tale surrounding its origins. This is a nice dessert version, a little sweeter than the one you'd get at the Buena Vista in San Francisco.

- 1.5 ounces Irish whiskey
- 1 ounce brown sugar syrup*
- Hot brewed espresso coffee
- Lightly whipped cream

Fill an Irish Coffee mug with hot water, let sit for 2 minutes, then discard the water.

Add the whiskey and syrup to an Irish coffee mug (or any mug) and fill with the coffee.

Top with an inch of slightly sweetened, lightly whipped cream (stop whipping before it peaks, it should pour).

*Brown sugar syrup: equal parts brown sugar and water. Heat until dissolved. Cool before using. ◆

In the office is a curio cabinet topped with bobbleheads of players Justin Turner, Cody Bellinger and Kirk Gibson, and sportscaster Vin Scully, and filled with memorabilia: signed baseballs, mugs, cards, and a picture of Mark and son PJ at Dodgers field.

"I was born in Santa Monica and have always been a Dodgers fan," says Mark. "Jane became a fan after we got together." When asked why they're fans of the Dodgers, Mark readily responds, "Because they are the best team on earth!"

The Lannons moved to Kala Point in March 2019 from San Luis Obispo County on California's central coast where they lived for seven years.

We moved to Port Townsend almost 16 years ago from Kamas, Utah, where eight years before, we had started an alpaca ranch with two pregnant female alpacas, eventually expanding to 20 animals. We were both working at the time, and would get up early to feed and water the animals, drive an hour to get to work, then return home to again take care of the livestock.

Weekends were spent doing all the other chores involved in ranching or driving to show the alpacas in competitions or attending conferences to learn more about the industry. Neither of us had grown up on a farm or ranch, so the learning curve was straight up! We also held spinning and weaving classes at the ranch and used our own processed alpaca fiber for the yarn.

Dan retired from the University of Utah where he worked as the assistant vice president of Student

Services. His 33 years there involved him overseeing such diverse departments as student housing, student health services, campus dining services, fieldhouse operations, the university golf course, and lastly, the building of the 2002 Winter Olympic Village located on the campus. One of the customs of the Olympics is to trade pins that represent your country or area; Dan has a wall of prized pins that he traded while staying in the Village.

At that point, I had retired from an engineering company where I was a Human Resources manager involved in the recruiting and hiring of new hardware and software engineers, as well as providing management training for company personnel and acting as mediator in employee relations situations.

Years before, it took both of us moving "out west" to initially find each other. Dan, being in an Army family, grew up in Japan and Hawaii, and finally settled in New York near West Point. Dan decided to start

college in Utah after working in the construction industry for five years.

I grew up on the very southern tip of Rhode Island across the Sakonnet River from Newport. As it turned out, our families lived only a five-hour drive from each other.

July Gardening Tips

July is the month to sit back and enjoy the beautiful outdoors and your garden. Relax – there are far fewer chores to be performed in the garden this month.

We are in the hottest part of our year in the Pacific Northwest. It is vital to keep your garden adequately watered during this warm month. Water may roll off the surface of the dry ground and not reach the plants at all; make sure you are watering them and not your sidewalk. Try dampening the hardpacked soil slightly first so that a second application of water actually reaches the plant. Water in the early morning or in the cool of the evening



to avoid evaporation. Prioritize any new plantings as well as containers and food gardens. Well-established plants need less watering; water less often, slowly and deeply.

If you have a lawn, keep it cool by cutting at the highest setting on your mower. Water no more than once a week to encourage root growth.

Fertilize your annuals and perennials every two weeks with a low nitrogen, high potassium and low phosphate fertilizer. An easy way to remember the formula (10-25-10), is the first number (10) is nitrogen (N) for leaf growth, the second (25) is phosphorous (P) for flowers, and the third number (10) is potassium (K) which promotes root growth. Apply the solution to both leaves and soil. You will be rewarded with beautiful flowers and healthy plants.



Deadhead and cut back spent blooms of both perennials and annuals to increase the number of flowers and to keep your yard looking tidy. Plants such as delphiniums, catmint, hardy geraniums and phlox should be cut back to about six inches immediately after flowering. They will rejuvenate and reward you with a second blooming later in the summer. Water well after cutting them back.

If your plants, such as phlox, bee-balm, asters or roses get powdery mildew, spray with a mixture of four tablespoons of baking soda to one gallon of water. Add a little dish soap to help it stick to the leaves.

Lavender, for sachets and potpourri, is best if gathered just as the buds show color and before they open.

Shop nursery sales for plants to fill in your containers. Keep them spruced up and they will look good well into the fall.

Have fun in your garden and don't forget the sunscreen! ◆

Website Ad Hoc Advisory

Meeting June 7 via Zoom

At the June 8, 2021, meeting, the KPOA Board gave approval for the Website Advisory Committee (WAC) to proceed with development of a Scope of Work (SOW) based on the concepts and recommendations for a rebuild of the KPOA website.

The work of the WAC began last fall when the Board received a proposal to rebuild the website. There were warnings about website instability, along with a claim that the cost of rebuilding the website would be recovered by savings in maintenance costs.

The Board authorized the KPOA President to convene an ad hoc study group to consider two questions:

- 1. What would it cost to "stop the bleeding" in terms of IT maintenance costs?
- 2. What purpose might be served by investing in a new website?

The initial WAC was set up to represent the interests of frequent website users: KPOA Board, Finance, Publications, Emergency Preparedness and, for good measure, two members at large. The committee discovered that the claim of website instability was overstated, but that there was much potential for improvement. We coalesced around a three-part purpose statement for designing a new menu structure:

- **Promoting Kala Point** the proposed menu includes six landing pages visible to all, providing a quick tour of the features and amenities that make Kala Point so attractive.
- Informing/Engaging the KPOA Community
 once logged in, members and residents will see links to calendars, directories, meeting agendas, and forms for everything from reserving pickleball courts, to signing up for emergency text alerts, to asking questions about rule enforcement, and to applying for tree removal and/or home improvement permits. Everything in this plan is aimed at providing greater efficiency, responsiveness, and accountability.
- Facilitating KPOA Governance each committee will have its own landing page that includes their mission statements, a list of committee members, meeting announcements, a link to relevant administrative policies and

procedures, a full-text searchable archive of past agendas and minutes, plus an option for multimedia postings (customized for each committee).

Below is a diagram of the tentative navigation structure for the new website.

The WAC is currently developing a SOW that will be used for requesting proposals from qualified contractors. We are hoping to gain approval from the Board to distribute requests for proposals (RFPs) before the end of the summer.

When the numbers come back, the Board will then decide whether to invest in a new website. If the answer is yes, we could have a new website up and running sometime this fall.

In the meantime, the Strategic Planning Committee is developing a survey to include questions about the KPOA website. You may also send comments/feedback directly to Gary Obermeyer (kpoaboard obermeyer@ kalapoint.org). ♦
