2022 Annual Membership Meeting Summary

The 2022 Annual Membership Meeting for budget ratification, election of new board members, and other membership resolutions was held December 13, 2022. The meeting was called to order and a quorum declared with 309 membership units voting out of 601 eligible voting units (51.4%). The meeting was an in-person/Zoom hybrid. In attendance in the clubhouse were Board members D. Kimball, president; M. Lannon, vice president; D. Nordlund, secretary; and S. Rovanpera and J. Erreca, directors. S. Moss, director, attended on Zoom. Also in attendance were Keith Larson, general manager; and Felice Thompson, administrative assistant II. In addition, there were 10 members attending in person and seven members on Zoom.

Minutes of the December 2021 Annual Membership Meeting were approved. The main business of the annual meeting was the report from Elections Trust. Jeana Holme presented the report for the Elections Committee. There were two budget-related resolutions, and the election of three new directors.

Resolution #2022-1: Approval of the 2023 Annual Budget

Total votes for: 282 Total votes against: 27

Resolution #2022-2: Resolved that any excess of membership income over expenses for the year ending December 31, 2022, will be applied to the assessments for 2024 as provided by IRS Revenue Ruling 70-604.

Total votes for: 307 Total votes against: 2

2025)

Joseph Reeves: 222 Kevin Skolrud: 257 Sue Stanton: 240

President D. Kimball and General Manager K. Larson gave their annual reports.

New Business

The Board recognized and thanked the following individuals for their volunteer service: Donna Colwell, CFO and past director; Michael Machette for his service as chair of the Architectural Committee; and Mike Burk for his service as chair of the Publications Committee [*Editor's Note:* Mike was a valued long-time Publications Committee member, but never served as chair].

The Board bid farewell and thanked the outgoing board members: Jean Erreca, director; Dan Kimball, president and director; and Scott Rovanpera, director and past president. The board then welcomed incoming board members Joseph Reeves, Kevin Skolrud, and Sue Stanton. It was announced that the 2023 Annual Membership Meeting will be December 12, 2023. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned. •

December Board Meeting Summary

The December 13, 2022, KPOA Board Meeting was held following the Annual Membership meeting. A quorum was established. In attendance in the clubhouse were Board members D. Kimball, president; M. Lannon, vice president; D. Nordlund, secretary; and Directors S. Rovanpera and J. Erreca. Director Moss attended by Zoom. Also in attendance in the clubhouse were Keith Larson, general manager; and Felice Thompson, administrative assistant II. There were 10 in-person attendees and five Zoom attendees.

The agenda was approved as submitted, and the minutes of the October 25, 2022, special Board meeting and the November 8, 2022, regular Board meeting were approved. From the consent calendar, Pamela Thompson was approved as a member of the Publications Committee. The General Manager's report was deferred to the January board meeting. Committee reports can be found on the Board of Directors' landing page under "Committee Reports."

At this point in the meeting, the outgoing directors left their places and the new directors were seated. The main business of the rest of the meeting was the appointment of directors to fill three vacant unexpired terms, election of corporate officers, and the assignment of committee representatives. After much discussion of how to proceed, the Board moved forward with hearing from candidates to fill the vacant positions. Subsequently, the Board appointed Kim Titus to a one-year term, and Dale Moses and Pat Miles to two-year terms. The new Board then elected Mark Lannon as president, Joseph Reeves as vice-president, and Dan Nordlund as corporate secretary. Kevin Skolrud was appointed as CFO.

Next order of business was assignment of Board representatives (rep) and alternates (alt) to committees. To bring our committee structure in line with current state law, the Architectural, Grounds, and Tree committees were designated as Committees of the Board with the remaining committees being designated as Advisory Committees. The following assignments were made: **Architectural:** M. Lannon (rep), P. Miles (rep), S. Moss (rep); **BMAC:** P. Miles (rep), K. Titus (alt); **Elections:** D. Moses (rep), P. Miles (alt); **EPC:** S. Stanton (rep), D. Nordlund (alt); **Finance:** J. Reeves (rep), M. Lannon (alt); **Grounds:** J. Reeves (rep), K. Skolrud (rep), D. Moses (rep); **Internal Control:** S. Stanton (rep), D. Moses (alt); **Personnel:** M. Lannon (Chair), J. Reeves (rep), K. Skolrud (rep); **Publications:** D. Moses (rep), S. Moss (alt); **Social Plus:** D. Nordlund (rep), K. Titus (alt); **Strategic Planning:** M. Lannon (rep), D. Nordlund (rep), S. Stanton (rep), J. Reeves (rep); **Tree:** D. Nordlund (rep), S. Stanton (rep), K. Titus (rep).

There being no further business, the board voted to recess until the January 10, 2023. Board meeting.

Chetzemoka Trail Talk on January 19

Did you know that the faces of Chief Chetzemoka (spelled čičməhán by the S'Klallam), his brother, Klow-ston, and the Chief's two wives See-hem-itsa and Chill'Lil are carved at the top of the columns that flank the former main entrance of the Port Townsend Post Office? The Post Office was built in the late 1890s as the U.S. Customs House after Chief Chetzemoka's death.

Jamestown S'Klallam Tribal Elder Celeste Dybeck and Lys Burden, representing Quimper Unitarian Universalist Fellowship's Native Connections Action Group, partnered with the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe to develop an interpretive trail chronicling the life and impact of Chief Chetzemoka. He was the last hereditary chief of the S'Klallam people. Other trail members include Jo Blair, Maria Mendes, Connie Ross, Luzi Pfenniger, Terry DuBeau and Amy Hepburn.

The intent of the trail is to educate the public on the relationship between the European settlers who arrived in Port Townsend in the mid-19th century, and the S'Klallam people who had lived there for thousands of years.

The trail officially opened June 29, 2019, and features 17 signs throughout Port Townsend. Each sign details a significant historic connection to Chetzemoka and the S'Klallam people. It includes several sites in the downtown historic district, and extends out to Laurel Grove Cemetery, the Port Townsend Golf Course, North Beach, and to Fort Worden State Park.

Join Lys and Celeste for a Chetzemoka Trail Presentation on Thursday, January 19, at 4 p.m. at the Kala Point Clubhouse. ◆

Their processing center is at Fort Worden at the Putnam Bunker, near Alexander's Castle and the giant madrona tree. When they get a truckload (20 bags, about 550 pounds), it will be taken to a recycler in Kent, all at no cost. Start out the New Year on a positive note!

The Fastest Growing Sport in America

If you haven't heard of pickleball, you may have been living under a rock these last few years. Invented on Bainbridge Island in 1965, pickleball is rapidly gaining players, and was recently designated as the State Sport of Washington. Large complexes are being built in many communities and HOAs, and while some think of it as a retiree's activity, it is very popular with all ages. My adult children (ages 30 and 33) visited over the summer and got hooked. They have begun playing in their spare time, and they, like us more mature folks, find it fun and social, and great exercise.

Here at Kala Point, there are more than 60 folks who actively play pickleball. Many weeks during the summer the two courts above the lagoon are full, and we have to spill over onto the tennis courts! Tennis courts are larger, and the nets are higher than pickleball nets, so it is challenging to play there. Pickleball truly kept us Kala Pointers sane when COVID was keeping us from being able to gather inside.

The Kala Point Pickleball Club holds at least one fun tournament each year. It could be "Polar Pickleball" in the dead of winter, or maybe on a holiday weekend. This year, Louise Tragard and John Galanes created a tournament with some variations on the traditional game. "Mortimer" and "Dink" were fun to learn and they certainly helped hone our skills. We have also held "Learn to Play Pickleball" clinics, held over a couple weekends. These always attract new players.

In 2023, the Pickleball Advisory Group is offering an "Introduction to Pickleball" day on Saturday, March 4. Anyone age 12 and up can come any time between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. and try out the game for as long as you like. In the meantime, everyone is welcome to come down to the courts and watch, ask questions, or join in during open play. •



Sign To Be Installed at Shipwreck Site

An aerial view of the Southern Chief shipwreck on the Kala Point beach at low tide. The likely sign position is indicated by a yellow square.


The framed sign will be installed on the beach once a suitable spot has been found.

A little more than 128 years ago, the Southern Chief—a ship described as "the most perfect specimen of decayed marine architecture that ever reached Puget Sound"—was towed by tugs to Kuhn's Spit (now known as the Kala Point beach), run aground and burned. A sign commemorating the ship's history has been created, approved by the Board, and will be erected near the remains of the shipwreck.

The remains of the *Southern Chief* shipwreck can be viewed when the tide is at five feet or less. The ship — a bark, or sailing ship with three or more masts — was built in Maine around 1817, and measured 187 by 38 feet. Over her lifetime, she hauled illegal immigrants, coal, lumber, and grain.

The sign highlights the ship's colorful and occasionally deadly history, her connection to Port Townsend, and how she came to lie on the Kala Point beach.

Keith White is responsible for the sign's concept. Michael Machette created content and gathered photographs, and Suzanne Eggleston edited and designed the sign. Mike Burk provided photo-editing assistance. •

Sharing the Good Life

It's simple to put together and uses only a few ingredients. If you haven't caught your own Dungeness crab, use good quality canned lump crab meat and you won't be disappointed! Hot Crab Dip

8 oz. cream cheese

8 oz. crab meat (drain well if using canned)

1 heaping Tablespoon horseradish

1 tsp lemon juice

In a medium bowl, using a hand mixer, blend room-temperature cream cheese with the rest of the ingredients. Mix well and spread in a shallow baking dish. This part can be done up to a day ahead

Bake in a 350 oven until the top just barely begins to brown. Enjoy! ◆

Kathy grew up on a farm in the Midwest, where horses were — and continue to be — a big part of life. (She cares for a friend's elderly horses.) She received her BS at Northern Arizona University and worked as a dental hygienist for years. Kathy also had a 14-year career in the spa and hospitality industries in southern California, and has tales from when she was a manager at a spa facility that saw more than 1,000 guests a day in summer. After moving north to Santa Rosa, she worked for the Sonoma County Sheriff's Search and Rescue team for several years.

The Americans discovered that the teens spoke almost perfect English (taught throughout their schooling), but were self-conscious about speaking with "actual Americans." Cliff grew up and went to college in Las Vegas. He traveled for seven years, including living in England, Germany, Canada and South Africa, and visiting more than 30 countries. Today Cliff works as a management consultant, executive coach and cultural change specialist, teaching dialogue skills to leaders in large organizations, mostly with nonprofits and federal agencies. Cliff helps groups explore how their ways of communicating shape the decisions they make. He is a founding member of and editor for the US Academy for Professional Dialogue.

We collected two carloads of toys, clothing, shoes, gift cards, and money. Your generous donations benefited 221 families and more than 500 children in Jefferson County this year.



Financial Review

Certificate of Deposit

Keith reported that Kala Point has purchased a \$100,000 CD at Kitsap Bank with a 3.5% return.

Meeting on December 6, 2022

New Business:

- Received a presentation from the Kala Point Pickleball (PB) Group to convert the tennis courts near the lagoon into pickleball courts:
 - Approximately 60 KPOA members play pickleball, and another 20-40 guests play by invitation only
 - Kala Point PB members play year-round on a two-hour time slot schedule
 - Keith Larson noted that pickleball is the #1 sport played at retirement communities
 - Michael Machette suggested that pickleball is a valued amenity at Kala Point
 - Reviewed the possible layout conversions for the tennis courts into PB courts
 - SPC suggested that the PB Group market their proposal within Kala Point, then host a "town hall" meeting, followed by inclusion in the SPC annual survey in March to determine membership interest in this capital improvement
- Discussed the feasibility of installing photovoltaic (PV) panels on the clubhouse to generate electricity to heat the pool:


